PROGRAM COMMITTEE REPORT

ENROLLMENT AND COURSES

- Total enrollment of 208 members. Exactly the same number as enrolled last year.
- Offered 12 courses in the fall, with one field trip and 11 during the winter season.
- Cancelled two of the fall courses and four of the winter session for the following reasons: insufficient enrollment or the instructor declined due to other commitments
- Number of registrations for audits for university courses: 29. These came from 14 different members.
- For all the courses that ran this year, there were 197 registrations.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

- Summer Potluck held August 28, 2013, had the highest attendance over the past few years. Credit for this could be due to the fact that we had a booth at the Wolfville Farmer's Market the week previous, where advertising was handed out for the potluck.
- Two of our most popular courses were "Early Medieval Europe Through Material Culture" taught by Jennifer MacDonald and "Vanishing Frontiers: The Polar Regions" by Graham Daborn. These had the highest enrollments in paid courses in recent years.
- Brown Bag lunches have certainly grown in popularity this season. We've had to change our location to a larger room

NEXT SEMESTER

- The two-semester program that was set up to align with the university format – Fall and Winter, appeared to be well received. Next year, we hope to offer more in the way of one-day seminars, nature walks and travel talks.
- In the area of medical science, we hope to offer a course in brain health which is a topic which was very well received during one of our BBL's.
- In writing and literature, we hope to have Ami MacKay who is a Canadian journalist and novelist, author of The Birthing House and Virgin Cure. The ALL program is credited for some of her success as she benefited from a course which she took from Ed Thomason, several years ago.
- Travel talks with our well-travelled board member, Brian Jones will be sure to tap our interest as well.

PARTNERSHIP

- We will soon be sending 3 of our board members to the Atlantic 50+ Conference in Halifax.
- We will be liaising with our local public library for our own version of the popular book club.
